Student Guide: Irish

GCE Irish will give you a fascinating insight into the world of Irish. Whilst developing the ability to communicate confidently and effectively in Irish in both speech and writing, you will also learn about the contemporary society, cultural background and heritage of Ireland and communities where Irish is spoken. Your own personal development will also benefit greatly from taking GCE Irish. It will strengthen your confidence and help you gain a positive attitude to learning and independent study. The AS units can be taken separately as a stand alone qualification or you can take the AS units combined with the A2 units to gain the full A Level qualification.

Q. Is this course suitable for me?

If you have an interest and a desire to learn and experience the world around you then you will be well suited to this course. The AS course can be taken on its own without progressing on to the full A Level qualification and this will still provide you with a wealth of knowledge and competency in Irish for use in leisure; however if you wish to specialise in Irish at degree level or equivalent, it would be beneficial to complete the A2 units and obtain a full A Level qualification.

Q. What do I need to be able to take this course?

Before taking this course you will need to have obtained a good GCSE standard or equivalent in Irish. You should also have a good knowledge of the culture and society of Ireland and communities where Irish is spoken and of course a desire to enhance this knowledge through further study.

Q. What will I learn about?

For GCE Irish you will study 2 units at AS and 2 units at A2. We have identified 5 broad Contexts for Learning. These are basically topic areas which you will study and explore whilst developing your language skills. 3 will be studied at AS and a further 2 at A2.

AS	Relationships	Health & Lifestyle	Young people in Society
A2	Local & Global Citizenship	Environmental Awareness	

You will develop an understanding and knowledge of these areas in both a local and global context. As well as this, in your A2 year; you will study and explore an aspect of Irish society and also an Irish literary text.

Throughout your AS and A2 years you will

- become familiar with reading and listening to extracts in Irish taken from authentic sources and extracting information from them.
- develop the skill of translating passages of information from Irish into English and vice versa.
- enhance your ability to hold a conversation in Irish, expressing ideas and justifying opinions.
- learn how to write essays in Irish using grammar accurately and applying a range of structures.
- develop the skills to discuss and write in Irish about literary and societal themes.

At the end of this course you will not only have improved your ability to communicate at a much higher level in Irish but you will also have gained a very thorough knowledge of Irish culture and society.

Q. How is this subject assessed?

<p>AS 1 Speaking</p> <p>35% of AS 17.5% of A Level</p>	<p>This is made up of a presentation which you will prepare in advance, followed by a conversation. It will be conducted by an external examiner.</p> <p>In all, the speaking test should last approx. 13 minutes.</p> <p><i>Available in January and summer.</i></p>
<p>AS 2 Section A – Listening</p> <p>Sections B & C – Reading and Writing</p> <p>65% of AS 32.5% of A Level</p>	<p>This test will consist of 2 questions based on 2 passages recorded on individual CDs. It will last 30 minutes.</p> <p>These sections are combined into one paper which lasts 2 hrs 15 minutes.</p> <p>Section B consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2 reading comprehension questions based on one text • translation into English <p>Section C consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • one extended writing question. <p><i>Available in January and summer.</i></p>
<p>A2 1 Speaking</p> <p>17.5% of A Level</p>	<p>This is made up of a discussion based on a societal theme which you will study throughout your A2 year followed by a conversation. It will be conducted by an external examiner.</p> <p>In all, the speaking test should last approx. 15 minutes.</p> <p><i>Available in summer only.</i></p>
<p>A22 Section A – Listening</p> <p>Sections B & C – Reading and Writing</p> <p>32.5% of A Level</p>	<p>This test will consist of 2 questions based on 2 passages recorded on individual CDs. It will last 35 minutes.</p> <p>These sections are combined into one paper which lasts 2 hrs 25 minutes.</p> <p>Section B consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 3 reading comprehension questions based on 2 texts • translation from English into Irish <p>Section C consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • one essay based on a literary text <p><i>Available in summer only.</i></p>

Q. What can I do with a qualification in Irish?
